ALL OUT FOR MAY DAY SUNDAY, MAY 1ST, UNION SQUARE 12:00 - 5:00 PM

This year's May Day promises to be one of the biggest, most exciting and most important May Days in recent years. While at the time of this writing, many specifics of who will participate in the program and other details are still being worked on, enough has been achieved to date that we can see that this year's May Day will be qualitatively improved from previous recent efforts. (Although those recent efforts helped lay the base for this year's event).

The theme of "Unity Will Win - Jobs, Peace, Equality" in this election year has struck a responsive chord among many forces. This year's May Day Committee has been meeting as a coalition of organizations. The first, "generic" leaflet lists twenty participating organizations. The next leaflet that comes out will list forty. Many groups are organizations that work closely with the Party, although in previous years, they have not felt it was possible to participate in May Day. Most of the groups are left and solidarity groups that have participated in May Day before. All of these groups will be having tables on the Square and helping to mobilize their membership for May Day.

Labor participation is not yet confirmed as of this writing. We are confident, however, that there will be more labor tables of unions on strikes and more labor speakers than previous years.

Pete Seeger has agreed to perform and will open the Solidarity Festival at Noon.

The three political parties participating will be speaking at the Unity Rally. Our Party (Comrade Gus Hall), the Socialist Party (probably their Chair, David McReynolds - although it's not confirmed yet) and a representative of PSP.

WBAI will broadcast the event.

A featured speaker will be Lea Tsemel, an Israeli civil rights attorney, whose only New York City appearance of her U.S. tour will be at May Day.

Leslie Cagan, the National Coordinator of the June 11th Demonstration will be speaking and we are arranging for a speaker from the May 14th Family Day Rally as well.

ANC and SWAPO haveagreed to speak and there will be a joint peace statement from Iranian, Iraqui and Kurdish organizations -- and there will be more.

The overall format is: set-up at 9:00 A.M. - tables at 11:00 - Solidarity Festival 12 to 3:00 - Unity Rally 3:00 to 4:00-4:30.

We are also working on a children's program and supervision for children at the Union Square playground.

May Day is important every year. It is a working class protest holiday, a unifyer of progressive issues and movements, a "made in the USA" international working class solidarity holdiay and a public barometer of the relative size of the left. This year May Day's additional importance lies in its potential to increase the impact of the left both politically and organizationally on the electoral process. A successful May Day has the potential of raising the level of unity of left initiatives in the elections, including for left and communist candidates.

#### To Make May Day A Success

All the endorsements of May Day mean that there is a better framework for a successful May Day. None of this will be achieved without a full mobilization of the Party. Therefore:

ALL PARTY MEMBERS SHOULD ATTEND MAY DAY AND BRING THEIR FAMILY FRIENDS, ETC.

Clubs should mobilize broadly for May Day through their mailing lists, tabling, etc.

Individual comrades and clubs should think about how to organize participation in May Day - meeting for rides to Union Square - Sunday brunch, then go down together, etc.

If we are members of an organization that has endorsed May Day, we should help guarantee that that organization mobilizes its base and doesn't just table and speak.

May Day should be promoted at the April 23rd - 26th recruiting events.

#### DISTRICT HOUSING ACTIVISTS MEET ON MARCH 12

Over 40 comrades and guests attended the recent district housing conference. The conference focused on the current political situation regarding housing issues, on the tasks before us in moving the struggle forward and in building the party, and on the role of clubs in initiating militant grass-roots actions.

One participant stated that as the housing crisis grows deeper, we must up the ante. It is possible to do so and in fact people, outraged by the situation, are demanding it. There is a broad sense of outrage about homelessness and other housing problems, which needs to be translated into even more actions.

There was a consensus that the only solution is public or publiclyowned housing. In New York City, this means immediate rehabilitation of the 100,000 vacant apartments in city-owned buildings.

Koch and Cuomo as well as Reagan were roundly blasted for creating and tolerating people being pushed onto the streets to live.

The sharp recist edge in all the policies of gentrification and displacement, lack of funding for affordable housing, failure to enforce anti-discrimination laws, is evident. A Howard Beach situation is only possible where segregated communities exist.

It was noted by several speakers that housing problems are getting lots of attention in the public workers and other trade unions. Active housing committees are being formed.

There was discussion of recent legislation to outlaw warehousing of apartments and of the need to push this legislation. Also discussed was the approximately \$350 million in new housing money which the legislature is currently deciding how to spend.

Another participant whose building is confronting warehousing and a co-op plan expressed the need to us to lead people to "stay and fight" for our homes and communities -- for working people there's simply nowhere else to go.

Among proposals and recommendations from the conference were the following:

- Neighborhood and community clubs to take on a particular housing struggle, with involvement of current, housing activists and other club members; housing commission to provide assistance.
- . West Side (Manhattan) clubs to meet to plan strategy for fightback against gentrification and over-development.

- . Housing commission to develop more specific plan of action for struggle around vacant city-owned buildings.
- Our candidates for Congress and other offices to project a militant housing program involving more Dollars for construction of permanent affordable housing; halting of "privatization" trend; strengthening tenant laws; and relief for small home owners.
- Organize for May 24 Tenant Unity Day in Albany.
- Build the Party -- don't just help out in housing struggles, but bring an advanced position and the PDW, in better targeting and distribution of PDW articles on housing.

Jarvis Tyner in his closing remarks stressed the need to "make every Party club a center of housing activism" -- that housing should be on every club's agenda because it is an issue that affects people's lives so much. The coming months are an opportune time and we can help "set the stage for the post-Reagan era," when a peoples' movement to solve the housing crisis can begin to show more results. The Party needs to be out there.

We must also in the coming period, beginning at the club and neighborhood level, make every candidate and elected official deal with housing issues. In this connection, we should not treat Tenant Unity Day (May 24) as routine but should help make sure it is the biggest lobby day ever for the tenant movement.

#### ISRAELIS TO APPEAR FOR PDW JUNE 3

Prominent Israeli peace leaders Felicia Langer and Tawfig Zayyad will be appearing at a public event in New York City on Friday morning, June 3, at the New York Society for Ethical Culture. They will report on the uprising in the Israeli occupied territories and bring the message that Jews and Palestinians can work together for peace and justice in the Middle East.

Langer and Zayyad are touring 6 cities, including New York City, to conclude the 1988 PDW Fund and Circulation Drive. Coming at a critical time when new coalitions are forming almost daily, to challenge the long silence in the U.S. over the Middle East, the PDW tour can make a major contribution to this struggle while opening new opportunities to build the PDW.

#### PDW FUND DRIVE AN OPEN LETTER TO THE PARTY MEMBERSHIP

Comrades, only 7 weeks remain in the 1988 PDW Fund and Circulation Drive, and we must all take urgent action if we are to meet the financial goal set for New York State. Our quota of \$125,000 equals one-fourth of the national goal of \$500,000. Therefore, the NY District has a major responsibility to guarantee the success of the entire drive, and to insure that the funds for continued publication of the PDW are available.

At this halfway point, we have only reached 25% of our goal. Many clubs have not yet made any contribution toward their club goals. While the NY District Office will raise a substantial portion of our quota, we cannot meet our quota unless each club also works to complete its goal. Also, through the club membership, we can reach more effectively for support from non-Party friends.

Therefore, our actions must include:

- 1. every club immediately set activities to meet its goal;
- 2. every club hold one public event for the PDW in April or May;
- 3. district and club fund goals to be completed by May 31.

Since this year's May Day celebration will be on Sunday, all clubs and members have the opportunity to participate fully, so this is a good time for club booths to raise finds for the PDW. Many other ideas for fund-raising can come from serious club discussions.

We are confident we can meet and surpass our goals if every comrade and every club does their share. The New York Party leadership is ready to assist the clubs in this common effort, so let us hear from you.

#### URGENT REMINDER FOR CLUB CHAIRS AND FINANCE DIRECTORS

Outstanding registrations as of 12/31/87 must be submitted to District Office immediately.

Every effort should be made to have all 1987 dues and assessments paid up. 1987 dues and assessments should be submitted to District on a separate Club Finance Report.

1988 dues should be collected on a current basis and turned in to District promptly. Do not hold. Industrial concentration assessment of \$5.00 per member due May, 1988.

Clubs are obligated to turn in unfulfilled Party Fund Drive goals. Payments made directly to National Office or PDW should indicate Club to be credited.

Do you know, comrades that the UCL is having a membership drive at the same time the Party building drive is taking place?

Spring is here -- and with it, there's been a burst of activity.

Several months ago, over 700 students converged at Rutgers University for a conference aimed at setting up a national left student organization. The huge turnout was clear evidence of the radicalization that's taking place on the college campuses.

Just a week after this event, students at the University of Massachusetts at Amherst took over a building to demand action against racism and racist violence. YCLers played a leading role in this struggle, and Jason Rabinowitz, a well-known YCL leader on the campus was elected co-president of the student government.

Students are taking an active part in organizing the June 11th peace demonstration.

All of this points to new levels of activism among young people. They also show new prospects for building our Party and the

Young Communist League in this period. We think that the Party and YCL Building Campaign can make big gains among young people.

This spring is an especially good time for outreach and recruitment among youth, because on the weekend of June 17-19, the YCL will hold its 3rd National Convention at the Univeristy of Massachusetts. (See enclosed Call). The Convention will be open to guests -- if they haven't joined by then, they'll be inspired to do so by the experience of the Convention, we're sure.

This Convention will be even more exciting and "dynamic" than the last. There will be:

- -- short plenary sessions!;
  - -- a variety of workshops, including on the "how-to's";
    - -- music and theatre presentations;
    - -- an exhibition of the work of young artists;
    - -- a big party on Saturday night.

The New York State YCL would like to take 60 youth to their Convention.

The full, roundtrip fare, meals and housing for one youth cost \$45.00. The New York State Committee is proposing that each Party club Adopt-a-Youth, and 1) raise the \$45.00 to send a young person to Amherst and 2) send a youth from your concentration area. Please bring your contribution to the District Office marked YCL Convention.

- 3. Established special PDW committee to be chaired by Comrade Jarvis Tyner.
- 4. Voted fullest support for YCL State Convention, June 4th and National Convention, June 17-19. Proposed every club try to send and/or support through scholarship (\$45.00) one youth to the Convention.
- 5. Reaffirmed full support for June 11th Nuclear Disarmament Demonstration at the UN as main initiative for the spring.
- 6. Called for Party support for May 14th Family Day Demonstration.
- 7. Adopted main report by Comrade Jarvis Tyner, discussion, summary and proposals.

To end discrimination against women, to secure equal pay for equal work, to win publicly funded day care, requires unity, of men and women, youth and the trade union movement, Black and white.


To enact an effective government policy to rid our neighborhoods of drugs and drug-related violence, requires unity.
